Introduction

This report is an update of the initial report on trends in population, labor force, employment and unemproyment in the CNMI. This report include the results of the 4th quarter 1999 Current Labor Force Survey in the CNMI. The fourth quarter, 1999, CLFS included Saipan, Rota, and Tinian making the results comparable to prior censuses; however, the survey did not collect data on education and wages. Hence, this report update trends in population, labor force, employment, and unemployment, but not wages in the CNMI.

Unlike the first report that had two sets of tables, this update only has one set of tables in Appendix A.

The format of the report remained the same—the report summarizes the trends in the body of the report and makes extensive references to tables in Appendix A.

Population in the CNMI from 1996 to 1999 were estimated based on the methodology described in Appendix B.

Summary

The following summary highlights major trends and changes in the CNMI population, labor force, employment, and unemployment from 1973 to 1999.

Population

- Population in the CNMI increased dramatically between 1980 and 1990 and continued to increase through 1999.
- Migration was the main reason for the drastic increase in the CNMI population during this period.
- Employment and business purposes were the main reasons for migrating into the CNMI—the majority of all migrants in the CNMI were temporary resident workers, business persons and their spouses and dependents. The migrant-worker population now outnumbers the local population. The vast majority of migrant-workers were non-US citizens who came from Asian countries, particularly, from the Philippines and China.
- The growth in the migrant-worker population has influenced the demographics of the overall CNMI population. From 1980 to 1999,
 - Age distribution shifted from a younger population to a working-middle-age population
 - Median age increased from 19.6 in 1980 to 27.4 years of age in 1995.
 - Birthplace of the population shifted from a majority born in the CNMI in 1980 to majority born outside of the CNMI in 1990 and after.
 - Citizenship of the population shifted from a majority US citizens in 1980 to a majority non-US citizens in 1990 and after.
 - Ethnic composition changed from a Chamorro majority in 1980 to Asian majority with Filipino becoming the largest single ethnic group by 1990 and after.

Labor Force and Employment

- Drastic increases in economic activities during this period led to high labor force participation
 and employment in the CNMI. The local population entered the labor force in unprecedented
 numbers. Because of a relatively small population base, the economy began to rely on outside
 sources for manpower needs resulting in a large number of migrant-workers.
- The reliance on migrant labor resulted in shifts in the labor force.
 - From a minority in 1973, migrant workers increased drastically after 1980 becoming the majority of the total CNMI labor force by 1990.
 - From a minority in 1980, non-US citizens become the majority of the total CNMI work force by 1990.
 - The birthplace of the labor force shifted from a majority born in the CNMI to a majority born outside.
 - The ethnic composition of the labor force changed from a predominantly Chamorro in 1980 to predominantly Asians, with Filipinos being the largest single ethnic group in the labor force by 1990 and after.
 - By 1990 and after, migrant workers outnumbered local workers in all industries, except in "public administration" and "finance, insurance, and real estate".

Unemployment

- Unemployment rate was high in 1973 (12.6%), low in 1980 (2.4%) and 1990 (2.3%), but increased in 1995 to 7.3 percent and was estimated at 4.3 percent in 1999, fourth quarter.
 - Unemployment rate has been higher for the local work force compared to the migrant work

force. However, migrant-workers are becoming a significant proportion of the total unemployment–from about 10 percent in 1980 to about 44 percent of total unemployment in 1995 and estimated at about 24 percent in 1999, fourth quarter.

- Between 1980 and 1999, age distribution of the unemployment population has shifted higher.
- The birthplace of unemployed persons changed from 1980 to 1999–persons born outside have been increasing as a proportion of total unemployed.
- The citizenship composition of unemployed persons changed from mostly US citizens in 1980 to a significantly non-US citizens by 1995.
- The ethnic composition of unemployed persons in the CNMI became more Micronesians and Asians and relatively less Chamorros and Carolinians.

Chapter 1. CNMI Population

1.0 Population

The total population in the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands (CNMI) increased steadily from 8,290 (in 1958) to 16,780 (in 1980). The Commonwealth's population more than doubled between 1980 and 1990 to 43,345 persons, an annual growth rate of 9.5 percent. The population in the CNMI continued to grow at an annual rate of 5.6 percent from 1990 to 1995, reaching 58,846 persons in 1995. By 1999, the population was estimated at about 81,000 persons.

Since 1980, the vast majority (about 90%) of CNMI's total population has resided in Saipan. Saipan is the biggest island of the 14 Northern Mariana Islands and is where most of the economic activities take place. In the fourth quarter, calendar year 1999, Saipan's population was estimated at 73,000 persons while Rota's population was estimated at about 4,400 and Tinian's population at about 3,400. Table 1.0 below shows population trends in the CNMI by island from 1920 to 1999. Population estimates for 1996 to 1999 are explained in Appendix C.

The main reason for the dramatic growth in population in the CNMI was migration. The main reasons for migrating into the CNMI were for employment and business opportunities. As shown in this report, CNMI's overall population characteristics—age, ethnicity, citizenship, place of birth, gender—have changed dramatically because of the large increase in the migrant population in the Commonwealth.



1.1 Population by Age

The age structure of the CNMI population changed significantly between 1980 and 1990: the median age of the population increased and the age distribution of the population changed from a relatively young population to a more middle-aged population.

1.1.1 Median Age

The median age of the CNMI population increased quite drastically from 19.6 years in 1980 to 27.4 years in 1990. The median age is the age that divides the population into two halves; for example, half of the population in the CNMI was younger than 27.4 and the other half was older than 27.4 years of age. The median age increased during this period for two reasons: (1) the CNMI's indigenous population was aging, people were living longer and birth rate was declining; but more importantly, (2) the presence of a large migrant-worker population in the CNMI, which is concentrated between ages 20 and 54, pulled the median age of the CNMI's total population higher. The median age remained at this higher level between 1990 and 1999.

1.1.2 Age Distribution

The age distribution of the CNMI total population shifted significantly between 1980 and 1990. In 1973, and in 1980, age group 0 to 4 years old, constituted the largest age group followed by age groups 5 to 9, 10 to 14, 15 to 19, 20 to 24, ..., 80 to 84, and 85 and over. But by 1990, age group 25 to 29 became the largest age group followed by age groups 30 to 34, age group 20 to 24, age group 35 to 39 and then age group 0 to 04 years old. Since 1990, age groups between 20 to 39 years of age (the middle age-groups) have continued to outnumber the lower and the higher age groups. The shift in the age structure of the CNMI population is best described using a population pyramid chart.

In a population pyramid, a horizontal bar represents each age group of the male population and each age group of the female population. The horizontal bars for each age group for male and female populations together form a chart that resembles a pyramid, such as the top part of Chart 1.1.2.1 below. The shape of the pyramid depicts the age structure of the study population.

In 1980, the CNMI population pyramid resembled a regular pyramid shape, where age group 0-4, at the bottom of the chart, was the largest age group followed by age group 5-9, 10-14, 15-19 and on up to age group 75 and over. The shape of the CNMI population pyramid shifted from this regular shape between 1980 and 1990. By 1990, the horizontal bars no longer resembled a regular pyramid, but looked more like a Christmas tree or a two-tier pyramid, one bigger pyramid sitting on top of a smaller one. In 1995 the age group horizontal bars deviated even further from the regular pyramid shape. This two-tier pyramid shape continued up to 1999. The shift in age distribution, as depicted by the population pyramid, resulted from the age distribution of the migrant-worker population in the CNMI. The shape of the larger pyramid on top, that starts at age group 20 to 24 through age group 45 to 49, is dictated by the number of migrant workers in the Commonwealth who outnumbered the indigenous population in these age groups. The smaller pyramid on the bottom, that starts from age group 0 to 4 through 15 to 19 age group, reflects the increasing number of total births in the CNMI in recent years. But although the number of births has been increasing in recent years, the number of migrant workers remains higher still. Comparing the age pyramids for 1980 through 1999 also explains why the median age of the CNMI population is much higher now then it was in 1973 or 1980.

The percent distribution of the age groups also shows the shift in the age structure of the CNMI's population. As shown in Table A.1.0., in 1973, age group 0 to 4 years old constituted the largest age group at 16.7% of total population followed by age group 5 to 9 years of age, 10 to 14, and 15 to 19 at 15.1%, 13.2%, and 11.3 %, respectively. But by 1990, age group 25 to 29 years old became the largest age group at 15.9% of total population, followed by age group 30 to 34 years of age, 35 to 39 and 20 to 24 age groups at 14.1%, 10.8%, and 9.8%, respectively.

Age distributions among males and females were similar in 1973 and 1980, but by 1990 and after, the female population became relatively younger than the male population. The age percent distribution of females and males in 1995 reveals that, on the one hand, the female age group 25 to 29 years constituted almost 18% of total females followed by the 20 to 24 and 35 to 39 age groups at 14.2% and 12.9%, respectively. On the other hand, the male age group 30 to 34 years of age constituted 13.3% of total male population followed by age groups 35 to 39 and 25 to 29 years of age at 12.4% and 12.4%, respectively.

The same population age structure in the CNMI in 1995 continued through to 1999, as shown in Table A.1.0 in Appendix A.

1.2 Population by Citizenship


The migrant-worker population has influenced the characteristics of the overall population in the CNMI. One way to see this influence is to look at the total population by citizenship over time. As shown in the Chart 1.2.1, in 1973 over 80 percent of the CNMI population were US citizens and in 1980 just under 80 percent were U.S citizens. But by 1990 and later, more than

50 percent of total CNMI population were non US citizens. A summary of the CNMI total population by sex and by citizenship is shown in Table A.2.0 in Appendix A. Recent labor force survey in the CNMI indicates the same trend, as shown in Table A.2.0


The fact that the migrant-worker population was concentrated between 20 to 54 years is best depicted in a population pyramid showing males and females by age group and citizenship. For example, Chart 1.2.2 below reveals clearly that non-US citizens outnumbered US citizens in the middle agegroups (20 to 54 years old).

In addition to the pyramid chart, as shown in Table A.3.0 in Apppendix A, in 1995, non-US citizen females outnumbered US citizen females more than 4 to 1 in age group 25 to 29, more than 3 to 1 in age group 20 to 24 and 30 to 34, and 2 to 1 in age groups



35 to 39. Similarly, non-US citizen males outnumbered US citizen males 3 to 1 in age groups, 30 to 34 and 35 to 39 and 2 to 1 in age groups 25 to 29 and 40 to 44. Recent labor force survey in the CNMI indicates this same trend, as shown in Table A.3.0, non-US citizens continued to outnumber US citizens in the middle age-groups in the CNMI in 1999.


Chart 1.2.2 Male and Female Age Distribution by Citizenship in the CNMI in 1999



1.3 Population by Place of Birth

A look at the CNMI population by place of birth is similar to what has been shown by looking at total population by citizenship; that is, the majority of total population were migrant workers and their dependents who were born outside and migrated into the CNMI recently.

As shown in Chart 1.3.1, in 1973 and 1980, the vast majority (74.9% and 71.5%, respectively) of the CNMI population were born in the Marianas. But by 1990 and after, the majority of the total population in the CNMI were born outside, mostly in Asian countries, particularly in the Philippines and, more recently,




China. In 1995, almost 50 percent of total population were born in Asian countries and migrated into the CNMI; 30.4 percent were born in the Philippines and 11.5 percent were born in

China. CNMI-born were 37.8 percent of total population while persons born in Micronesian were almost 6 percent of the total population.

Recent labor force survey in the CNMI indicate the same population trend by place of birth. According to recent survey, as shown in Chart 1.3.2, in 1999, persons born in the CNMI were 40 percent of the CNMI's total population, followed by persons born in the Philippines (25%) and persons born in China (16%). Persons born in Micronesia were about 5 percent of the CNMI's total population in 1999.

As shown in Table A.4.0, birthplace by sex reveal that females born in China increased much faster than any other group, since 1990, becoming the second largest group of the total female population in the CNMI in 1999, at over 24 percent.




1.4 Population by Ethnicity

With the presence of a large migrant worker population, the CNMI is now a multi-ethnic population.

As shown in Table A.5.0, in 1980, about 57 percent of the CNMI population were Chomorros, about 14 percent were Carolinians, 10 percent were Filipinos, and about 9 percent were Micronesians (from Palau, FSM, and the Marshall Islands). However, by 1990 Filipinos surpassed Chamorros as the largest single ethnic group. In 1990, about 32 percent of CNMI's population were Filipinos, 29 percent were Chamorros, over 5 percent were Carolinians, 8 percent were Micronesians and about 7 percent were Chinese. In the 90s, the Filipinos contin-

ued to be the largest single ethnic group while Chinese were the fastest growing ethnic group. The Chinese were less than one percent (0.2%) of CNMI's population in 1980, but increase to 6.7% in 1990, and 11.5% in 1995. Recent labor force survey, as shown Chart 1.4.1 and in Table A.5.0, indicate that Chinese were about 16% of the CNMI's total population in 1999. Since 1980, Chamorros and Carolinians have been declining while Asians have been increasing as proportions of the CNMI's population. The Micronesians have remained at about the same proportion of the total population since 1980.

The number of Individuals who report multiple ethnic background has been increasing since 1980, perhaps reflecting growing intermarriage among different ethnic groups in the



CNMI. Persons who reported multiple ethnic background were only 3% of the total CNMI population in 1980, but by 1995 this group had increased to almost 10% of the total CNMI population.

More recent data on ethnicity in the CNMI indicate that, like the place of birth by sex, in 1999, Chinese women constituted the second largest single ethnic group of the total female population in the CNMI while Filipino males constituted the largest single ethnic group of the total male population in the CNMI, as shown in detail in Table A.5.0 in Appendix A.

1.5 Year of Entry of CNMI Migrants

The fact that the majority of the current CNMI population are workers who migrated into the Commonwealth in recent years is best described by looking at the "year-of-entry" of those born

outside and who migrated into the CNMI. In 1995, the most recent year when complete data are available, over 62% (36,626 persons) of the total CNMI population were born outside and migrated into the CNMI. Of this total, almost half (17,319 persons) came into the CNMI within the 2 years (1994 and 1995) preceding the census date, September 9, 1995. Another one-third came within the 3 to 5 years preceding the census date. In other words, over 80 percent of migrants had only been in the CNMI 5 years of the 1995 census date.

As shown in Table A.6.0 in Appendix A, about 90 percent of the estimated total migrants in the CNMI in 1999 were non-US citizens. About 47 percent of these came to the CNMI within the 3 years before the 4th quarter, 1999, survey period, 80 percent came within the 10 years of survey period.

Recent survey data in the CNMI indicates the same trend—that the majority of migrants came into the CNMI in recent years, as shown in Table A.6.0.

1.6 Reason for Migration to the CNMI

Almost all migrants in the CNMI came for employment and business purposes. Again, based on the 1995 census, the most recent year when complete data are available, almost 92 percent of all migrants were in the CNMI for employment or business purposes or spouses, dependents or family members of employed or business persons, as shown in Table 1.6 below.

Recent labor force survey data in the CNMI indicates the same trend—that the vast majority of migrants come to the CNMI because of employment and business purposes, as shown in Table A.7.0.



Chapter 2. Labor Force Participation

2.0 Labor Force Participation

The labor force population includes persons who are 16 years of age and older who are employed or who can be employed and are willing to be employed; the labor force population excludes persons less than 16 years old and those not looking and/or not willing to take a job. (Detailed definitions for labor force participation and other related terms may be found in several sources such as the 1990 Census of Housing and Population). As already established in Chapter 1, the migrantworker population is concentrated in the middle age-groups and came to the CNMI primarily for employment and business purposes. Hence, the influence of the migrant-worker population is more pronounced on the CNMI labor force demo-




graphics—age, citizenship, place of births, ethnicity, and gender—than in the CNMI total population.

The number of persons participating in the labor force in the CNMI increased dramatically between 1980 and 1990 and continued to increase through the rest of the 1990s. The tremendous economic growth in the second half of the 80s and the 90s not only required importation of labor but also enabled the indigenous population to enter the labor force in unprecedented numbers. As shown in Chart 2.0.1, in 1973 and 1980, only 63% of persons 16 years of age and older participated in the labor force. By 1990, labor force participation rate had increased to about 82 percent and has

remained over 80 percent since.

Labor force participation rates have increased over time for both males and females; however, it is important to note, as shown in Chart 2.0.2, and Table A.8.0, that while the male labor force participation rate has been relatively high, the female labor force participation rate was low in 1973 (39.6%) and increased to a high of over 81 percent in 1995. Recent labor force survey results in Saipan indicate that female participation rate has remained high in the CNMI, as shown in Table A.8.0.



2.1 Labor Force by Age

The labor force participation rate by age over time has been influenced by the migrant-worker population. As shown in Chart 2.1.1 and in Table A.9.1, labor force participation rates were higher in the middle agegroups where large number of migrant workers fall. Labor force participation rates were lower in age group 16 to 19 and age groups beyond age 54.


Labor force distribution by age has changed since 1973, as shown in Chart 2.1.2 and in Table A.9.0. for the CNMI, Labor force percent distribution by age show that in 1973 age group 20 to 24 constituted the largest number of total persons in labor force followed by age groups 25 to 29, 30 to 34, 35 to 39, and 40 to 44. But by 1990 and after, age group 25 to 29 became the largest age group in the labor force followed by age group 30 to 34, 35 to 39, and 20 to 24. Again the age distribution of the labor force population here is being dictated by the age distribution of the migrant-workers population since they constitute the large majority of all persons in the labor force.


The female labor force population was relatively younger than the male labor force population, again, similar to what was observed in Section 1.1.2.


2.3 Labor Force by Citizenship

As shown in Chart 2.3.1 and Table A.10.0, in 1973 and 1980, the majority of persons in the labor force were US citizens, 72.5 percent and 62.2 percent, respectively. But by 1990, non-US citizens became the majority of the total labor force in the Commonwealth, outnumbering US citizens 3 to 1.

As shown in Chart 2.3.2 and in Table A.10.1, labor force participation rates of non-US citizens were much higher than labor force participation rates of US citizens, since 1973. This is expected since non-US citizens come to the CNMI primarily for employment or








business. Asian migrant workers must secure employment before they leave their countries and arrive in the CNMI.

Recent labor force survey in the CNMI reveal a significant change in the gender composition of non-US citizens in the labor force in the CNMI, as shown in Table A.10.0. That is, while male US citizens have outnumbered females in the labor force since 1973, non-US citizen females outnumbered non-US citizen males in the CNMI's labor force. This shift occurred between 1990 and 1995 and was more pronounced in 1999. The shift in the gender composition among non-US citizens in the labor force is primarily because of the large number of Chinese




female workers in the garment manufacturing industry in Saipan, as discussed below.

2.4 Labor Force by Place of Birth


As shown in Chart 2.4.1 and in Table A.11.1 and B.11.1, those born in Asia, particularly, the Philippines and China have higher labor force participation rates than those born in the CNMI or Micronesia. One important reason for this, as discussed under Section 2.3, is that workers born in the Philippines, China and other Asian countries must secure employment before leaving their countries to the CNMI. Labor force participation rates for persons born in the CNMI have increased, since 1973, but remain lower compared to those born in Asian countries.

Recent labor force survey in the CNMI, as shown in Chart 2.4.2 and in Table A.11.0, indicate that, by place of birth, females born in China were the largest single group of the total female labor force population. Males born in the Philippines comprised the largest group of the total male labor force in the CNMI.



2.5 Labor Force by Ethnicity


Labor force participation rates vary among ethnic groups, as shown in Chart 2.5.1 and in Table A.12.0. The Chinese and the Filipinos had higher labor force participation rates while the Chamorros and Carolinians had lower labor force participation rates.





The ethnic composition of the CNMI labor force has been changing dynamically since 1980. As shown in Chart 2.5.2 and in Table A.12.0., in 1980, Chamorros constituted the largest single ethnic group in the CNMI labor force at 47 percent, followed by Filipinos at 22 percent and Carolinians at 10 percent. However, by 1990, Filipino had become the largest single ethnic group in the CNMI labor force (47%) followed by Chamorro (16%), Chinese (10%), while Carolinians declined to only 3.0% of the CNMI's labor force. In 1995 Filipino was still the largest single ethnic group at over 44 percent of labor force, while the Chinese (17%) surpassed the Chamorros (15%) to become the second largest single ethnic group in the labor force. Recent labor force survey results in the CNMI indicates that the Chinese have become an even greater proportion of the CNMI labor force. Survey results showed that the Chinese constituted about 26 percent of the total labor force in the CNMI in 1999, as shown in Chart 2.5.3.

Male labor force participation rates were higher than females' across ethnic groups, except for Chinese females in the CNMI. Recent labor force survey results in the CNMI show female Chinese to have the highest labor force participation rate at 99 percent in 1999, as shown in Table A.12.1. This is mainly because of the large number of Chinese females in the labor force employed in the garment industry. The 1999 labor force survey estimated over 10,000 female Chinese in CNMI's labor force, making them the largest female ethnic group in the CNMI labor force in 1999. On the other hand, Filipino males constituted the largest ethnic group among all males in the labor force, and have been so since 1990.

The labor force survey results in the CNMI, as shown in Table A.12.0, also indicated that Filipinos continued to be the largest single ethnic group in the CNMI labor force. The survey also indicates that Chinese and other Asians continued to increase while the Chamorros and the Carolinians have been declining as proportions of the total CNMI labor force.








Chapter 3. Employment

3.0 Total Employment

The total number of persons employed in the CNMI economy increased dramatically between 1980 and 1990 and the number continued to increase up to 1999, as shown in Table A.13. The huge increase in the number of employed persons in the CNMI is one clear demonstration of the tremendous economic growth during this short period of time. While the total CNMI population increased about 2.6 times between 1980 and 1990, the number of employed persons increased 4.4 times during this period, from 5,941 in 1980 to 25,965 in 1990. Total employment further increased to 34,812 in 1995.




As shown in Chart 3.0.1 and Table A.13.0, recent labor force survey in the CNMI estimated over 46,000 employed persons in the CNMI in the fourth quarter, 1999.

3.1 Employment by Major Industries

From 1980 to 1990, the number of workers increased in all industries in the CNMI. The number of workers continued to increase from 1990 to 1995; however, not all industries increased in employment; some industries increased in number of workers while others declined. Manufacturing, particularly the garment manufacturing, increased from 79 persons in 1980 to 7,770 in 1995, becoming the second largest industry in the CNMI, in terms of number of workers. Retail trade, Transportation, communication and other utilities, and the Services industries also increased in number of workers during this period. On the other hand, construction industry reached a high of 5,767 employed persons in 1990, but declined in 1995. The Public administration increased from 1980 to 1995 in terms of number of workers.

Recent labor force survey data in the CNMI indicate that *Manufacturing* and *Service* industries continued to be the biggest industries in terms of number of workers. Survey results estimated over 14,000 workers in the manufacturing industry in CNMI, in 1999, making it the second largest industry in terms of number of workers in the CNMI. *Construction* showed some decrease in the 1999, while some industries showed small gains and other industries, small losses. See Table A.13.0 in Appendix A for detail on recent trends in employment by industries in the CNMI.




3.1.1 Employment by Major Industries and Sex


The sex composition in each industry differ. As shown in Chart 3.1.1.1, in 1999, females outnumbered males only in the *Manufacturing* and *Retail trade*, were about the same number as males in the Services industry, but fewer than males in the rest of the industries.


The male distribution differ from the female distribution across industries. As shown in Table A.13.0, since 1990, females were concentrated in the *Manufacturing*, Services and Retail industries, while males were concentrated in Construction, Services and Retail trade.


Recent labor force survey data in the CNMI, as shown in Chart 3.1.1.2, indicate that, in 1999, over 44 percent of all employed females were in the Garment manufacturing industry, about 33 percent were in the Service industry and about 8 percent were in the Retail trade industry in the CNMI, 1999. For males, on the other hand, 30 percent of all males employed were in the Service industry, 16 percent were in the Manufacturing, 14 percent in Construction, and 13 percent in Retail trade. Proportionately more males than females were in the Public administration in 1999, as has been the case since 1980.



The CNMI economy has become heavily reliant on migrant workers for its labor needs, which is quantified by looking at CNMI employment by citizenship. As shown in Table A.14.0, both the numbers of US citizens and non-US citizens have been growing, but the number of non-US citizens has been increasing much faster, so that by 1995, non-US citizen workers were three times the number of US citizen workers in the CNMI economy. In 1990 and 1995, about 75








percent of total employed were non-US citizens. Recent labor force survey in the CNMI indicate that this trend continued through to 1999 in the CNMI, as shown in Chart 3.1.2.1.

In all industries, except for public administration and finance, Insurance, and real estate, the vast majority of employees were non-US citizens, as shown in Chart 3.1.2.2 and Table A.14.0. In certain industries, workers were almost all non-US citizens, such as in manufacturing and construction. It is only in the public administration that US citizens have outnumbered the non-US citizens, since 1973.





3.1.3 Employment By Industry and by Place of Birth


The distribution of employed persons by industry differed among birthplaces. As shown in Table A.15.0 and Table B.15.0, persons born in the CNMI have been employed mostly in the *Public administration*, *Services*, *Transportation*, *communication*, and other utility, and *Retail trade*. As shown in Table A.15.1, persons born in the Micronesia have been employed in the *Services*, *Manufacturing* and *Retail trade* industries. And, as shown in Table A.15.2, persons born in Philippines were employed in the *Services*, *Retail trade*, and *Construction* industries while persons born in China were concentrated in the *Manufacturing* industry, as shown in Table A15.3.


3.1.4 Employment by Ethnicity

The distribution of employed persons by industry also differed among ethnic groups in the CNMI economy, but was somewhat similar to employment by birthplace. As shown in Chart 3.1.4.1, Table A.16.0, Chamorros have been employed mostly in the *Public administration*, Services, Transportation, communication and other utility, and Retail trade industries. Like the Chamorros, Carolinians have been mostly employed in the Services, Public administration, Transportation, communication and other utilities and Retail trade industries, as shown in Chart 3.1.4.2 and in Table A.16.1. As shown in Chart 3.1.4.3 and Table A.16.2, Micronesians have been employed in the Services, Manufacturing, Retail trade and transportation, communication and other utilities industries. As shown Chart 3.1.4.4 and in Table A.16.3, Filipinos were











employed in the services, Retail trade, and Construction industries while the Chinese were concentrated in the Manufacturing industry, as shown Chart 3.1.4.5 and in Table A16.4.

3.2 Employment by Occupation

The types of occupations in the CNMI economy have been changing over time in response to growth in the different industries in the CNMI since 1980. As shown in Chart 3.2.1 and Table A20.0, Operators, fabricators, and labors increased from about 10 percent of total employment in 1980 to become the largest occupational group in the CNMI economy in 1995, at over 27 percent of total employment. The services occupations also increased during this period. Other occupation groups-Managerial and professional specialty, technical, sales, and Administrative support and Precision production, craft and repair—also increased in number of workers over this period of time, but declined in relative size to the "Operator, fabricators, and labors" and the "Services" occupations.





3.2.1 Employment distribution by Occupation and sex


In 1973 and 1980, the largest number of all working women were in *Technical*, sales, and administrative support (44 percent), followed by those in *Services*, and *Managerial* and professional specialty occupational groups. By 1990 and after, *Operator*, fabricators, and labors became the largest occupational group among all women, followed by the *Services*, *Technical*, sales, and administrative support, and *Managerial* and professional specialty groups.

The shift in the relative sizes of the major occupational groups reflects the huge increase in employment in *Manufacturing* and *Services* and *Retail trade* relative to other industries, from 1973 to 1999.

3.2.2 Employment distribution by Occupation and citizenship

A look at occupational groups by citizenship over time reveals that non-US citizens have become the majority in almost all occupational groups. As shown in Chart 3.2.2.1, Operator,

fabricators, and labors, Services, and Precision production, craft and repair are now occupied mostly by non-US citizens, while occupational groups Managerial and professional specialty and Technical, sales, and administrative support were about evenly distributed between US citizens and non-US citizens. However, in 1980 and prior, US citizens outnumbered non-US citizens in all major occupational groups, except in Operator, fabricators, and labors, as shown in Table A.18.0. Recent labor force survey data in the CNMI indicate that this trend has continued up to 1999, as shown in Table A.18.0 in Appendix A.




3.3 Employment by Class of Workers

The increased size of the private sector in the CNMI economy is demonstrated by the tremendous increase in the number of employees in the *private for wage and salary workers* relative to government workers from 1980 to 1999, as shown in Chart 3.3.1 and in Table A.21.0. In 1980, 56 percent were in *private for wage and salary workers* while 42 percent were *government workers*. But by 1990, 84 percent of total employment were *private for wage and salary*


workers and only about 14 percent were government workers, as shown in Table A.21.0. in Appendix A. Recent labor force survey data in the CNMI continue to indicate this trend, as shown in Chart 3.3.1 and in Table A.21.0 in Appendix A.

Since 1980, relatively more females than males were employed in the private sector, as shown in Table A.21.0. For example, in 1995, over 85 percent of total female employment were private for wage and salary workers while only about 13 percent were government workers. That same year, about 80 percent of total male employment were private for wage and salary workers while almost 16 percent were government workers.



3.3:2 Employment distribution by Class of Worker and by Citizenship

In 1980, almost 53 percent of all employed private for wage and salary workers were non-US citizens. By 1990, almost 86 percent of all private for wage and salary workers were non-US citizens. In contrast, the government sector has been predominantly US citizen during this period. Recent labor force survey in the CNMI continued to show this trend, as shown in Chart 3.3.2.1 and in Table A.22.0 in Appendix A.



Chapter 4. Unemployment

4.0 Unemployment

Like the total population and the labor force in the CNMI, unemployment demographics have been influenced by economic growth and the presence of migrant workers in the CNMI.


The unemployment rate in the CNMI fluctuated from 1973 to 1999, as shown in Table A.23.1. In 1973, the CNMI unemployment rate was a high 12.6 percent of the total labor force. But declined to 2.4 percent in 1980 and even lower in 1990 at 2.3 percent. However in 1995 CNMI unemployment rate increased to 7.3 percent.

As shown in Chart 4.0.1, recent labor force survey in the CNMI indicated that unemployment in the CNMI was about 4.3% in the fourth quarter of 1999.

The number of persons not working and looking for work was high in 1973 at 601 persons, declined to 148 persons in 1980, increased more than three times to 616 in 1990 and again increased more than three times from 1990 to 1995 to 2,728. Recent labor force survey in the CNMI indicate that the number of unemployed persons fluctuated but remained above 2,000 persons since 1995.


The population characteristics of unemployed persons, like those of the labor force, have been

changing since 1973, again reflecting the influence of the migrant-worker population who now constitute a significant proportion of the CNMI unemployed population.




4.1 Unemployment by Age

As shown in Chart 4.1.1, Table A.23.1, unemployment rates across age groups and over time were consistently higher for age group 16 to 19 years of age. This is expected since persons in this age group are just entering the labor force for the first time with little or no work experience and no skills. The unemployment rate was also higher for age groups beyond 54 years of age. The low unemployment rates for the middle age groups is because persons in these age groups are more employable, but more importantly, because the migrant population, who are mostly employed, falls into these age groups and their relatively large numbers drive down unemployment rates in these age groups.



The age distribution of unemployed persons in the CNMI has been changing over time, as shown in Chart 4.1.2 and Table A.23.0. Unemployed persons in 1973 and 1980 were concentrated in ages 29 years and below. But by 1995 and after, the proportion of total unemployed in ages above 29 years of age had increased. This is partly because increasingly, total unemployed persons include migrant workers who were in these higher age groups. Recent labor force surveys in the CNMI indicates that this trend has continued up to 1999.



Generally, females have higher unemployment rates than males across age groups. Unem-


ployment percent distribution by sex show that unemployed females tend to be in the younger age groups compared to unemployed males. This follows the age distribution of the migrant-worker population, as discussed earlier.


4.3 Unemployment by Citizenship

As shown in Chart 4.3.1 and in Table A.24.1, the unemployment rate is higher for US citizen and permanent residents and lower for non-US citizens, and has been this way since 1973.

However, as shown in Table A.24.0, unemployment distribution by citizenship shows that unemployed non-US citizens has been increasing as a proportion of total unemployment in the CNMI. In 1973 and 1980 unemployed US citizens outnumbered unemployed non-US citizens. As shown in the Chart 4.3.2, in 1973 about 83 percent of total unemployment were US citizens. This proportion declined to 77 percent in 1980, 62.2 percent in 1990 and 46.7 percent in 1995. Recent labor force survey in the CNMI indicate that non-US citizens unemployed still constitute a significant proportion of total unemployment in the CNMI, as shown in Table A.24.0.

Possible reasons for increased numbers of unemployed non-US citizens may be because of displaced employees of companies that have gone out of business. Also, changes in the existing laws that allow for workers to switch employers without leaving the CNMI may allow for short-term unemployment.





4.4 Unemployment by place of birth

Unemployment by place of birth analysis is similar to that of unemployment by citizenship. Persons born in Asian countries who migrated into the CNMI had lower unemployment rates while those born in the CNMI and the Micronesian islands had higher unemployment rates, as shown in Table A.25.1. for CNMI.

However, looking at percent distribution of unemployment by birthplace reveals that persons born in Asia, particularly from the Philippines and China, were becoming larger proportions of total unemployment. In 1973, over 75 percent of total unemployed persons were born in the CNMI. This number declined to less than 50 percent in 1995. In the meantime unemployed persons born in the Philippines was a low 1.8 percent in 1973 but had increased to over 21 percent of total unemployment in 1995. Unemployed born in Micronesia fluctuated more than other groups. Recent labor force surveys in the CNMI indicates the same trend—that persons born outside who migrated into the CNMI have continued to make up a significant proportion of total unemployment in the CNMI.


4.5 Unemployment by Ethnicity


As shown in Chart 4.5.1 and in Table A.26.0, unemployment rates were higher for Chamorros and Carolinians and Micronesians and lower for Filipinos, Chinese and other Asians.

The ethnic composition of total unemployment in the CNMI has changed significantly since 1980, as shown in Table A.26.0. In 1980, 59 percent of total unemployment were Chamorros, 15 percent were Carolinians, 8 percent were Palauans, 3 percent were other Micronesians and 5 percent were Filipinos. Since then the Chamorros and Carolinians have declined while the Filipinos, Micronesians, and other Asians have increased as proportions of total unemployment in the CNMI.

Generally, females have higher unemployment rates than males across ethnic groups as shown in Table A.26.1.

Male and female unemployment distributions by ethnic group are quite similar. In both male and female distributions, Chamorro is still the largest group, but declining as proportion of total unemployment. Asians and Micronesians have been increasing as proportions of total unemployment. Persons with multiple ethnic background have been increasing as proportion of total unemployment from less than 2% in 1980 to over 7 percent in 1995. Recent labor force survey data in the CNMI indicated that this trend continued up to 1999, as shown in Table A.26.0.
