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Chapter 1
POPULATION

#### Summary of Population Statistics

The number of people in the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands increased tremendously between 1980 and 2000. This population growth took place in the islands of Saipan, Rota, and Tinian, but not in the Northern Islands. Since 1935, Saipan's population has risen proportionally more than Rota's and Tinian's population. By 2000, 90 percent of the ONMI total population lived on Saipan, about 5 percent lived on Rota, 5 percent lived on Tinian and less than one percent lived on the Northern Islands. Population density increased in Saipan much faster than in Rota and in Tinian. In 2000, Saipan's population density increased to 1,342 persons per square mile; population density also rose to 90 in Tinian, but it declined to 100 in Rota from 107 in 1995.

In Saipan, places of population concentration shifted from the western to the eastern side of the island. In 1990, Saipan's population were concentrated in Garapan, Susupe, Chalan Kanoa and San Antonio. By 2000, in addition to these places, also Koblerville, Kagnan, San Vicente and Tanapag had become major population places. In Rota while Songsong remained the largest population place, Sinapalu also become a notable place of population consentration. In Tinian, Marpo Heights became a new place of population concentration in addition to San Jose.

About 58 percent of the total population in the CNMI were born elsewhere and migrated into the Commonwealth in 2000. The majority of all immigrants were temporary residents who resided in the Commonwealth under employment visas. The age distributions of the immigrant and CNMI-born population differed substantially. Most immigrants were ages 20 to 39 years compared to a CNMI-born population whose median age was only 14.5 years. Major changes in CNMI population characteristics resulted from this presence of a relatively large number of immigrants. Some of the changes include: (1) a significant difference in the number of married males compared to the number of married females, (2) a high proportion of females employed, and (3) a higher median age.

The median age of CNMI population increased slightly from 1990 to 2000: the median age in 2000 was 28.6 years, compared to 27.4 years in 1990.

In 1990, males (22,802) outnumbered females (20,543) in the the CNMI population; in 1995, the proportion of males and females in the CNMI population was about even; while in 2000, females (37,237) outnumbered males (31,984). The sex ratio in 1990 was 111 males to every 100 female; in 1995 it was 99 males for every 100 females; while in 2000 it was about 86 males to every 100 females. Again, these shifts in the CNMI population characteristics resulted from the changes in the composition of the immigrant worker's population. The majority (74%) of the total population

lived in households in 2000 while 26 percent lived in group quarters. In 1995, 80 percent of the total population lived in households while about 20 percent lived in group quarters.

In 2000, 42 percent of the total population was born in the CNMI while 58 percent was born elsewhere and migrated here; of these, 90 percent came from Asian countries, particularly, from China (39%) and the Philippines (also about 39%). Compared to 1980, over 71 percent of the CNMI population were born in the Commonwealth. This shift in birthplaces of persons in the Commonwealth was more pronounced in Saipan than in Rota and in Tinian.

In 2000, as it was in 1995 and 1990, the Filipino ethnic group was the largest single ethnic group in the Commonwealth. This major demographic change was true only in Saipan where the majority of CNMI's population resided. The Chamorros were still the most dominant ethnic group in Rota and in Tinian, although, not as dominant as in previous Census years. In the Northern Islands where very few individuals reside, the Carolinians were the most dominant ethnic group.



#### Male-Female Ratio

In 2000, total females outnumbered total males with a male-female ratio of 86 males to every 100 females in the entire CNMI. By age group, males outnumbered females in ages 14 years and below; females greatly outnumbered males in the ages 15 to 34 years old and in 70 years and over; males outnumbered females in age groups 35-54 years. This is mainly because of the age-sex distribution of the nonresident workers in the CNMI. Nearly all garment workers were females between 19-29 years old, causing females to outnumber males in these age groups. Workers in the constuction industry were mostly males in age groups 35-60, resulting in proportional tely more males than females in this age group in the CNMI in 2000.

# Summary of Vital Statistics

The CNMI birth and death rates have declined over the past 15 years. Although the birth rate generally increased between 1984 and 1993, it has been declining since 1993; in fact, the CNMI birth rate in 2002 was the lowest during this period at 18.1 per 1,000 women.

The majority of all babies are born to mothers aged 25 to 34 years (55%), although 10% of babies in the CNMI were born to women aged 19 years and younger. Approximately 62% of babies were delivered by midwives in 2002, which is consistent with the past trends. In 2002, the total number of births in the CNMI declined from 1,451 in 2001 to 1,289.

About one-third (32%) of all live births in 2002 were born to Filipino mothers; 29% were born to Chamorro mothers; 14% were Micronesian mothers; 10% were born to other Asians mothers; and only 7% were born to Carolinian mothers. The proportion of babies born to younger mothers was highest among CNMI-born mothers; while, the proportion born to older mothers was highest among Filipinas. Approximately, 60% of all live births were to women who were not married and most babies weighted between 6.6 to 8.8 pounds.

The CNMI death rate in 2000, the lowest on records was 2.2 deaths per 1,000 persons. The infant mortality rate, also lowest in recent history, was 1.2 deaths per 1,000 live births. The death rate increased by decimal point only from 2.1 in 2001 to 2.3 in 2002.

## Births and Deaths

The CNMI birthrate generally increased between 1984 and 1993. However, the birthrate fell in 1994 from 30.4 to 25.8 births per 1,000 mothers, primarily due to the heavy immigration of single women into the CNMI. The birthrate has reached an all-time low of 20.7 births per 1,000 mothers in 2000. Over time, there has been a corresponding decline in the CNMI infant mortality rate. In 2002, the total number of deaths increased while the total number of births decreased from 2001.

#### Birth Patterns

There is an interesting pattern of births in the CNMI; slightly more births occurred from July thru December of the calendar year than from January thru June. This trend was not noted for the year 2000 as the number of births was nearly identical. The chart below indicates the registered live births by month for 2001. There were 1,289 live births in the year 2002, a decline from 1,451 in the year 2001.

# Marital Status of Mother

In 2002, 60% of all births were born to mothers who were not married and about 40% were born to mothers who were married.

## Mother's Birthplace and Age

In 2002, almost 34% of all live births were to mothers who were born in the CNMI and another 32% were born to mothers from the Philippines.

Approximately, 9% of births were by women from China and the remaining births were to mothers from elsewhere. The percentage of babies born to younger mothers was highest among CNMI-born mothers, while the percentage of babies born to older mothers was highest among Philippine-born women.

## Births by Mother's Ethnicity

About one-third (32%) of all live births in 2002 were born to Filipino mothers; 29% were born to Chamorro mothers; 14% were Micronesian mothers; 10% were born to other Asians mothers; and only 7% were born to Carolinian mothers.

# Summary of Education

The number of students enrolled in the CNMI public schools has steadily increased since 1995. There was a total of 13,521 students enrolled in public and private educational institutions during the 2002-3 school year. Enrollment figures have increased over time because of natural population growth, CNMI immigration, and program changes in the CNMI's Public School System. For example, in 1990, all public elementary schools integrated kindergarten into their curriculum. During the same year, officials reconfigured two additional grade levels to be more uniform with American standards. Enrollment also increased in the Headstart program in 1990 due to increased funding.

CNMI private schools also experienced growth in student enrollment during the 1995-2000 period. Since 1982, more than 10 new private schools opened their doors. Private schools enrollment comprised nearly 22% of CNMI's total student enrollment in 2002.

The lower grades continued to account for the largest proportion of total student enrollment. As students matriculate to higher grades, transfers and drop outs tend to increase.

The number of teachers and classroom assistants has also increased to meet rising demand. Data show that the number of school teachers with advanced degrees has increased over time as well. In fact, virtually all (99%) public and private school teachers in 1999 held 4 years college degrees compared to 83% five years earlier.

The student population is as diverse as CMMI's total population. However, local Chamorro, Carolinian, and "Chamolinian" students continued to comprise nearly 48% of the student body in 2001.

Enrollment at the Northern Marianas College (NMC) appears to have risen and fallen with the economy, where levels peaked in 1997. The gender composition of NMC college students shifted from majority - male in 1994 to majority - female during subsequent academic years. In 1999 - 2000, 58% of NMC students were female. Approximately 50% of all local college students that academic year were Chamorro, 23% were Asian, 13% were Pacific Islanders, 6% were Carolinians and 8% were from other ethnicities. In 2002, the average number of students per semester was 913. The total number of registered students was 2,740.

Figure 3.1 Percentagde of School Enrollment by Island: 2000



Educational Attainment

The proportion of adults aged 25 years or older earning at least a high school degree increased substantially between 1995 and 2000. Approximately two-thirds of adults in 1990 had obtained at least a high school degree compared to three-quarters in 1995. However, improvements in educational attainment may be indicative of the presence of immigrants who tend to arrive having high school degrees or greater.

# Chapter 4 LABOR FORCE AND EMPLOYMENT

### Labor Force and Employment Summary

The composition of CNMI's labor force has changed dramatically over the past twenty years. The labor force participation rate among all adults increased significantly, from 63% in 1980 to an estimated 84% in 2000. Women's labor force participation rate more than doubled from 39% to 82% during this period and the proportion of working mothers increased substantially as well. Women comprised more than half (54%) of the CNMI's total labor force in 2000, due largely to a large number of Chinese women working in the garment manufacturing industry. The CNMI unemployment rate for 2001 is estimated to be 3.9%, however including adults not active in the labor force drives this figure up much higher.

Labor force data also show that Filipinos comprised the largest working single ethnic group in 2000, which is to be expected since the majority of all adults living in the OMI are now Filipino. The labor force participation rate for Filipinos was more than twice the rate for Chamorros, the third largest single ethnic group represented in the labor force. This is a dramatic shift from 1980 when Chamorros comprised the largest ethnic group in the general population as well as in the labor force. Again in 2002, there were more Filipino participants in labor force than Chamorros and Carolinians in Saipan.

Private sector employment increased tremendously over the past two decades. In 1980, approximately 55% of the labor force worked for private companies and over 42% worked in the government sector. By 2000, nearly 87% of all employed persons worked for private companies. This change is attributed to the growth of apparel manufacturing, construction and tourism in the CNMI.

High demand for labor has shifted CNMI's labor force composition from majority US citizen to majority non-US citizen. In 1973, 72% of the labor force was comprised of US citizens, but by 1995 only 27% of the total labor force were US citizens. This shift was most pronounced among working women, 21% of whom were citizens in 1995 compared to 31% of working men. By industry, data indicate that the proportion of US citizen workers in services has remained relatively stable over time, about 32% to 34%. The proportion of US citizens employed in public administration increased from 28% in 1980 to 35% in 1995. Over time, US citizens

have continued to account for a small fraction of manufacturing workers (6% in 1995).

A closer examination of gender and employment shows that males in the CNMI are concentrated in construction while females dominate the apparel manufacturing industry. The proportion of males working in construction and public administration decreased from 1980 to 1990, although men entered the retail trade in higher numbers in 1995 than in previous years. The proportion of women in manufacturing rose from 1% to 44% over the two decades, while the proportion employed in services decreased (from 46% in 1980 to 32% in 1995). The percentage of women employed in professional and related services decreased from 24% to 7% over time as well.

Overall, Chamorros and Carolinians dominated occupations in the public sector, whereas Filipinos were concentrated in services and the retail trade. Chinese workers comprised the majority of all manufacturing jobs and Koreans tended to work in retail trades in 1999.

The number of nonresident work permits has risen and fallen with the economy, and most permits were issued to Chinese workers for jobs in the apparel industry. Overall, women accounted for 55% of all nonresident permits and workers' ethnicity largely determined the type of occupation for which the permit was issued. In Saipan, there were 14,000 non-U.S. citizen work permits issued to Chinese, followed by Filipinos of 12,058 in the year 2002.

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## Labor Force Participation

Between 1973 and 2000, dramatic changes occurred in the CNMI labor force.

- The labor participation rate among all persons 16 years and older rose from 63% to a high of 84%.
- Wamen's labor force participation increased from 39% to 82%.

Figure 4.1 Number of Persons in the CNMI Labor Force: 1973 to 2000



# Chapter 5 HOUSEHOLD AND PERSONAL INCOME

### Summary of Household and Personal Income

Results from the 2000 Census showed a median household income of \$22,898 in the CNMI, which means that half of all households earned above and half earned below this figure. The median family income was higher (\$25,853) for the same year. The statistical median serves as a better measurement than average or mean income since it is less sensitive to extreme cases. Thus, CNMI mean incomes reported for households (\$37,015) and families (\$37,986) were higher, since a minority of affluent cases positively skewed the mean. All census income data are based on income earned in 1999. In 2002 in Saipan, the estimated total number of households was 11,254, with a median household income of \$24,752.

Data also indicated that median household income was higher in Rota than in Tinian or in Saipan, with Tinian having the highest median family income.

The majority of CNMI households reported earning income from wages and a minority reported earning income from a variety of sources, including: interest, dividend and rental income, public assistance, and retirement and social security benefits.

2000 Census data on income also revealed that households with retirement income had the highest mean income of \$19,253 followed by Social Security Income at \$6,653.

#### OMI Income by Ethnicity Over Time

Income data on ethnicity show that households classified as "other single ethnic" have earned among the highest median incomes during the 1980-1995 period. These households tend to be Caucasian. Median incomes for all ethnicities except Chinese increased over time. The decrease in median wages among Chinese persons is attributed to the influx of low-wage gamment workers as well as a very small 1980 population size of individuals who tended to earn high median wages. Income trends for families over time follow the overall pattern for CMMI households by ethnicity.

Saipan Income by Ethnicity Over Time Median household and family income trends for Saipan follow the same pattern as the total CNMI. Overall, median household and family income rose between 1980 and 1990 before dropping slightly in 1995. Incomes increased for all ethnic groups except Chinese over time, a change which is likely attributed to the rapid growth of low-wage manufacturing jobs and a very small 1980 population size of relatively affluent Chinese persons.

#### CNMI Average Wages by Industry

In 1995, individuals employed in manufacturing for nondurable goods earned the lowest mean hourly wage of \$2.33. Public administration employees earned the highest mean hourly wage of \$11.81 that year, and experienced the highest wage increases over a fifteen year period. Saipan Wages by Occupation & Birthplace

# Summary of Accidents and Offenses

This chapter presents data on adult and juvenile criminal offenses as well as the number of traffic accidents occurring each month in the CNMI. Results indicate that the total number of adult criminal offenses committed has substantially increased over the past decade. The number of offenses committed by juveniles increased between 1995 and 1997, but has since declined. The majority of juvenile offenses for 1997 were curfew violations, assaults & battery, liquor consumption, theft, disturbing the peace, burglary, and controlled substance.

The number of DUI (Driving Under the Influence) arrests has increased each year, since 1999. Males continue to constitute the vast majority (98%) of total DUI arrests each year. In 2002, the following ethnic groups comprised most of all DUI arrests: Filipinos, Chamorros, Carolinians, and Koreans. The proportion of DUI arrests issued to these ethnic groups has remained about the same over the past five years.

The total number of traffic accidents fluctuated from year to year and averaged about 2,500 annually from 1998 to 2002.

# Total Number of Juvenile Criminal Arrests

# Summary of Voters and Elections

The number of registered voters in the Commonwealth increased from 13,384 in 1997 to 15,792 in 2001. By election district, District 1 had the highest number of registered voters (38%), followed by District 3 (22%), District 4 (16%), District 6 (9%), District 2 (7%), and District 5 (8%). The number of voters in each district however, reflects the population size of villages within the district, rather than the likelihood of residents to vote.

The total number of registered voters who actually voted increased between declined from 1997 to 1999 but rose again in 2001.

Although the total number of males voting was higher than females in 1997, 1999 and 2001 voting patterns between men and women were very similar. Registered male and female voters were most likely to vote in 1997 election and the number of voter registrations among men and women has increased over time. It is important to note that data do not indicate the likelihood of all men or women voting, however, since there may simply be more men than women in a given precinct. Registered female voters were actually somewhat more likely than male registered voters to vote.

In 2001, 20 percent of total voters were in ages 18 to 25 years old. According to 1999 voting records, Chamorros were the largest single ethnic group among registered voters followed by Carolinians, Americans, Filipinos, Palauans, then other US citizens.

# Summary of Visitors

The CNMI tourism industry experienced a sharp drop in the number of tourists following the onset of the 1997 Asian financial crisis. The number of visitors rose rapidly during the mid-1980's through 1990's, reaching an all-time high in 1997. The number of visitors declined from 1998 to 1999, increased in 2000, but again declined in 2001 and 2002.

Japanese persons accounted for over 70% of all CNMI visitors in 2002, followed by Korean (18%) and US & Guamanian (8%) tourists. The remaining 5% of CNMI visitors arrived from elsewhere around the world.

Virtually all CNMI tourist (97%) arrived in Saipan, as compared to Rota or Tinian. The number of visitors to Rota and Tinian has fluctuated over the past decade.

The number of hotel rooms in the CNMI increased from 740 in 1980 to 4,521 rooms in 2000. Unfortunately, this number decreased to 4,419 in 2001. This may be attributed to the decrease in the number of visitors for that year. The number of CNMI hotel rooms peaked in 1998 at 4,614 rooms, until the effects of the Asian fiscal crisis were fully realized.

Estimated total visitor expenditure in the CNMI increased from \$61 million in 1980 to about \$585 million in 1997.

The number of CNMI business arrivals has dropped sharply in response to the economic crisis. In fact, business visits decreased by half between 1998 and 1999. Business visitors tend to come from Korea, Japan and other countries including the U.S. Mainland.

Lastly, tourism data reveal that most young adult CMMI visitors between the ages of 20 and 29 years tend to be female, whereas, visitors aged 30 and older tend to be male. This striking pattern emerged between men and women regardless of their country of origin.

#### Number of Visitors to the CNMI

The total number of visitors into the CMI increased annually from 1994 to 1997, but declined sharply in 1998. Visitor numbers have rebounded slightly, but remained significantly lower than the 1997 levels. In 2002, the total number of visitors decreased to 424,932 from 497,685 in 2001.

#### Visitors by Island

The vast majority of CMMI visitors (97%) in 2001 arrived on Saipan. The number of visitors to Rota and to Tinian fluctuated from year to year, although, many more tourists traveled directly to Rota than to Tinian. In 2002, the total number of visitor entries were combined of Saipan, Rota and Tinian.

## Number of Hotel Rooms and Visitor Expenditures

According to the Marianas Visitors
Authority, the number of hotel rooms in
the CNMI increased from 740 in 1980 to
4,521 rooms in 2000. There is a total of
4,317 hotel rooms in 2002. Estimated
total visitors' expenditure in the CNMI
increased from \$61 million in 1980 to
about \$585 million in 1997. The total
number of hotel rooms declined in 2002.

### Visitors' Country of Origin

The majority of CNMI visitors arrived from Japan (75%). Korean visitors constituted the second largest group until their numbers decreased dramatically in 1998. The number Korean visitors increased in 2002. Approximately 8% of visitors were from the US and Guam in 2002. The number of visitors from the US and Guam has been declining since 1997.

# <u>Visitor Arrivals by Country of Origin</u> and Month

Data for the calendar year 2002 showed relatively little sessoral variation in the volume of tourists visiting the CNMI. More Japanese tourists visited the region in September and December than during other months, but tourist rates throughout the year remained generally constant.

# OMI Visitors by Age, Sex and Country of Origin

Data on age and gender of CNMI visitors reveal some interesting patterns.
Visitors aged 20 to 29 years were significantly more likely to be female, regardless of country of origin. The pattern reverses, however, among visitors aged 30 years and above who were much more likely to be male. This trend is evident across all selected countries of origin.

Total Number of Business Visitors

Total number of business visitors drastically declined in 1999. The number of business visitors to the CNMI appears to have dropped in response to the Asian financial crisis which began in 1997. It reached a high number of 11,205 in 1996. Business visits sharply decreased by half between 1998 and 1999 and arrival numbers were substantially lower than in earlier years.

## OMI Business Visitor Arrivals by Country of Origin Over Time

Data indicates that the number of CNMI business visitors from Japan peaked in 1996 and fell hereafter. Most business visitors come from Korea, other countries included Japan, Taiwan, Australia and the U.S. Mainland.

Chapter 9 HOUSING

# Summary of Housing

This chapter summarizes housing trends in the CNMI, primarily between 1990 and 2000. The figures for 2002 were from the CNMI Community Survey which was conducted on Saipan only. Census data indicate that the number of CNMI housing units increased significantly over time to accommodate rapid population growth. In fact the number of units increased 47% between 1990 and 2000. The vast majority of new housing units were built on Saipan. Housing construction in Tinian and Rota was more subdivided.

Over time, housing units generally improved in structure, as they were more likely to contain concrete roofs and walls, indoor kitchen facilities, and electric power. However, the proportion of housing units with complete plumbing facilities, actually decreased between 1990 and 1995, as many new units were built with incomplete plumbing. Approximately 40% of units had complete plumbing in 1995, compared to 72% in 1990. Units in Saipan were most likely to have complete plumbing (42%) in 1995 as compared to Tinian (16%) and Rota (19%). Three quarters of CNMI housing units received their water solely from public water systems, 16% used a combination of public and private systems and the remainder of unites relied on alternative water sources.

In 1995, approximately 33% of all housing units were owner occupied, 43% were renter-occupied, and the rest involved arrangements where the occupants paid no cash rent.

Over all, 61% of CNMI'S housing units in 1995 had telephone connections, 85% had radios, and 87% had television sets. Between 1990 and 1995, units were more likely to be equipped with these communication devices. Additionally, 90% of CNMI's housing units had cooking facilities, and over half of these units (57%) used electricity for cooking.

Over time, CNMI housing appears to have become less crowded. The median number of persons per room declined in Saipan, Tinian and Rota. Over all, the median number of persons per unit in the CNMI decreased from 5.4 in 1980 to 4.0 persons in 1995.

Lastly, over three-quarters (76%) of CNMI houses were valued at \$100,000 or above in 1995. Approximately 32% of these homes was appraised at \$500,000 or above. The concluding CNMI's median house value is presented in the concluding chapter of this yearbook, earning first place in house value compared to the mainland US and all US Insular areas. The housing units in Saipan slightly decreased from 15,527 in 2000 to 15,250 in 2002.

### Tenure and Persons per Occupied Housing Units

Over 32% of CNMI's housing units were owner-occupied while about 68% were renter-occupied units in 2000.

Over 69% of Saipan's units were renter-occupied in 2000 compared to 65% on Tinian and 48% in Rota in 2000.

About 74% (51,430 persons) of the CNMI's total population in 2000 lived in housing units while 26% lived in group quarters.

### Equipment and Facilities

More occupied housing units had electricity, cooking facilities, and refrigerators in 1995 than in 1990. Over all about 98% of housing units had electricity 99% had cooking facilities, and 90% had refrigerators in 1995. # Summary of Transportation and Communication

Data from the CNMI Bureau of Motor Vehicles show substantial fluctuation in the number of registered vehicles in the CNMI over time. In 2002, a total of 17,349 vehicles were registered on Saipan, Tinian and Rota. Fluctuations in vehicle registration numbers may be due to inaccurate record keeping.

Census data from 2000 show an average of 1.1 vehicles per household in the CNMI. A sizable proportion of households owned 2 vehicles (20%) and approximately 7% of households owned 3 or more vehicles in 2000. The absence of a public transit system increased the importance of owning a vehicle in the CNMI. The total number of CNMI's registered motor vehicles declined from 17,900 in 2001 to 17,349 in 2002.

The number of registered taxicabs peaked at 530 in 1997 and declined sharply thereafter. The total number of registered taxicabs was 224 in 2002.

The number of residential and business telephones installed in the CMMI has increased steadily over the past two decades. Prior to 1998, residential telephones accounted for over 50% of total telephones installed; however, since that year, business telephones have outnumbered residential. In 2001, there were 13,984 business and 11,322 residential telephones installed in the CMMI.

## Summary of Business Establishments and Trade

The number of business establishments, based on the Economic Census of business establishments that is conducted every 5 years, increased dramatically from 1987 (768) to 1992 (1,266), but declined slightly from 1992 to 1997 (1,232). While the number of establishment declined slightly from 1992 to 1997, total value of economic activities increased tremendously: total sales and receipts, total annual payroll, and total number of employees increased throughout this period. The decline in the number of establishments, during this period, was in the construction, wholesale and retail trade sectors. The tremendous increase in sales and receipts, annual payroll, and number of employee occured in all industries, but most particularly in manufacturing and the services industries.

Of the total number of establishments in 1997, 42% were in retail trade and 37% were in the services industry. Of the total sales and receipts in 1997, 37% came from manufacturing, 27% from retail trade, 21% from services, and 11% from wholesale trade. Of the total annual payroll in 1997, 45% was paid by manufacturing, 28% by services, and 17% by retail trade. Of the total number of paid employees in 1997, 47% were employed in manufacturing, 25% were in the services, and 17% were in retail trade. Clearly, in terms of sales volume, total annual payroll and number of employees, manufacturing is the largest sector of the CNMI's economy followed by the services and retail trade industries.

In terms of number of employees, manufacturing, particularly apparel, and the services industry, particularly hotels, increased significantly from 1992 to 1997.

Most of the business establishments in the CNMI in 1997 were considered small businesses, in terms of the number of employees: 38% of all businesses had less than 5 employees, 22% had 5 to 9 employees, 16% had 10 to 19 employees, 10% had 20 to 49 empoyees, and only about 7% had 50 or more employees. However, these 7% with 50 or more employees generated 62% of total sales and receipts, paid out 68% of total annual payroll, and employed 68% of total paid employees in the CNMI in 1997.

Most of the business establishments in the CNMI in 1997 were coparations: 85% of total establishments were corporations, 13% were sole propriatorships, and less than 2% were partnerships.

In sales volume, in 1997, 25% of all business establishments had total sales less than \$100,000, 54% had sales of \$100,000 or more, but less than one million dollars, while 21% had sales of one million dollars or more.

In 1997, 47% of all business establishments in the CNMI were owned by US citizens, 11% were owned by Japanese, 11% were owned by Koreans, 7% were owned by Chinese, and 5% were owned by Filipinos citizens.

The total number of business activities issued in the CNMI fluctuated from 1996 to 2001: the total figure declined from 1997 to 1999, but increase in 2000 and 2001.

Total bank deposits in the Commonwealth increased from 1996 to 2001, but declined in 2002. Total loans issued in the CNMI fluctuated from year to year from 1996 to 2001 and declined further in 2002.

Trade volume fluctuated, but generally declined, annually in the past five years. Inbound cargo at Saipan seaports reached a high of 692,268 revenue tons in 1996, but mostly declined from year to year since. Outbound cargo reached a peak of 200,575 revenue tons in 1998, but has generally declined from year to year since. In recent years, increasingly more imported commodities came from Asian countries and less from the United States.

#### Industry Trends

The number of business establishments, based on the Economic Census that is conducted every 5 years, increased dramatically from 1987 (768) to 1992 (1,266), but declined slightly from 1992 to 1997 (1,232).

While the number of establishment declined slightly from 1992 to 1997, total sales and receipts, total annual payroll, and total number of employees increased throughout this perid.

The decline in the number of establishments was in the construction, wholesale and retail trade sectors.

The tremendous increase in sales and receipts, annual payroll, and number of employee occurred in manufacturing and the services industry.

#### Percent Distribution by Industry

Of the total number of establishment in 1997, 42% were in retail trade and 37% were in the services industry.

Of the total sales and receipts in 1997, 37% came from manufacturing, 27% from retail trade, 21% from services, and 11% from wholesale trade.

Of the total annual payroll in 1997, 45% was paid by manufacturing, 28% by services, and 17% by retail trade.

Of the total number of paid employees in 1997, 47% were employed in manufacturing, 25% were in the services, and 17% were in retail trade.

Clearly, in terms of sales volume, total annual payroll and number of employees, manufacturing is the largest sector of the CNMI's economy followed by the services industry.

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#### Foonmic Activities by Island

Clearly, almost all economic activities in the CNMI were located in Saipan: 95% of all establishments, 98% of total sales and receipts, 97% of total annual payroll, 97% of total paid employees in the CNMI occurred or was located in Saipan in 1997. The result of the 2002 Economic Census is yet to come out, but it is expected that Saipan is still the economic center of the Commonwealth.

#### Establishment percent distribution by the number of employees

Most of the business establishments in the CNMI were considered small businesses, in terms of the number of employees, in 1997: 38% of all businesses had less than 5 employees, 22% had 5 to 9 employees, 16% had 10 to 19 employees, 10% had 20 to 49 empoyees, and only about 7% had 50 or more employees.

The 7% of total business establishments with 50 or more employees, generated 62% of total sales and receipts, paid out 68% of total annual payroll, and employed 68% of total paid employees in the CNMI in 1997.

# Bank Deposits and Loans

Total bank deposits in the Commonwealth increased from 1996 to 2001, but declined in 2002.

Total loans issued in the CNMI fluctuated from year to year from 1996 to 2001 and declined further in 2002.

### Inbound and Outbound Cargo

Trade volume fluctuated, but generally declined, annually in the past five years. Inbound cargo at Saipan seaports reached a high of 692,268 revenue tons in 1996, but has generally declined from year to year since. Outbound cargo reached a peak of 200,575 revenue tons in 1998, but has generally declined from year to year since.

Chapter 12 FISHING AND AGRICULTURE

# Summary of Fishing and Agriculture

In 2002, fishermen caught and sold 384,489 pounds of fish with a total market value of \$888,776 in the CNMI. The total pounds of fish caught in the CNMI was 346,251 in 2001 and slightly less in 2000. Pelagic (or troll) fish was the largest (58%) common group of fish landed in 2002, followed by reef fish (34%). Pelagic and reef fish comprised over 90% of all fish landed in the CNMI in the past three years. On average, invertebrates costs the most per pound followed by bottom fish, reef fish and then troll fish.

ONMI is a net importer of fish, the amount of fish imported fluctuate from year to year and showed a marked increase in 2002.

Data from the last agricultural census show that there were 103 farms in CNMI in 1997, with an average size of 33 acres. Total farming land area was estimated at approximately 117,760 acres. There were 88 farms with crops; 29 farms had cattle with a total of 1,789 cattle; 24 farms had pigs and hogs with a total of 831 animals; and 10 farms had goats with a total of 249 animals.

The total market value of farm products sold in the CNMI in 1997 (\$2,814,321) was more than doubled the amount sold in 1990 (\$1,063,950). The average sales per farm in 1997 (\$27,324) was three times more than in 1990 (\$8,941). In 1997, forty three (43%) of total sales came from vegetables and melons, 25% came from poultry and eggs, 14% came from livestock, and 9% came from fruits and nuts.

# **Summary of Revenues and Expenditures**

Based on reported total business gross revenue, the CNMI economy expanded in the early tomid 1990s, but generally declined in the late 1990s through 2002. Total business gross revenue (BCR) reached a high of \$2.59 billion in 1997; it declined in 1998 and 1999; increased in 2000; but declined again in 2001 and 2002. The decline in total BGR was greatly influenced by declines in the apparel manufacturing and the tourism industries BGRs.

The total amount of all government funds revenue and other financing sources increased each year from 1997 to 2001, but delined in 2002. A look at the major components of all government funds and financing sources reveal that, the total amount of general fund revenues has been declining since 1997 when it reached a high of \$248 million; in 2002 it was under \$200 million. The decline of the total general fund revenues has been due to declines in BRT, hotel tax, excise tax, and the user fee. As a percentage of all government revenues, taxes reached a high of 73% in 1996, but has been declining since. In 2002, local taxes was 61% of the total government revenues. Meanwhile federal contributions has increase as percentage of total CNMI government revenues during the same period. In 2002, federal contributions was about 20% of total government revenues. In addition, bond proceeds in 2001 contributed to a higher revenues for that year.

On the expenditures side, total government expenditures increase from 1995 through 1998 and fluctuated from 1999 to 2002. The relative shares of each government function expenditures to the total government expenditures remained about the same from year to year, since 1995. However, in the last two years (2001 and 2002), annual capital projects expenditures markedly increased. As a proportion of general fund operating expenditures, Health and Education expenditures increased slightly in the last five years. General Government declined markedly in 2002 from 2001. Debt service steedily increased in the last five years. In 2002, Health Expenditure was 21% of total operating expenditures, Education was 22%, General Government was about 15%, and Public Safety was about 10%. By object class, wages and salaries made up over 60% of total general fund expenditures annually since 1995. The actual percentage fluctuated from year to year and reached a high of 69% in 2002. Professional services expenditures follows wages and salaries. These two combined comprised over 70% of total general fund operating expenditure each year, since 1995, and reached a high of 77% in 2002.

# Trends in Major Components of Total Government Revenues

As a percentage of all government revenues, taxes reached a high of 73% in 1996, but has been declining since. In 2002, local taxes was 61% of the total government revenues.

Meanwhile federal contributions has increase as percentage of total government revenue during the same period. In 2002, federal contributions was about 20% of total government revenues.

Relative Share of Total Government Expenditures by Government Function

The relative share of each government function expenditure to the total government expenditures remained about the same from year to year, since 1995. However, in the last two years (2001 and 2002), annual capital projects expenditures markedly increased.

# Trends in the General Fund Revenue

The total amount of general fund revenues has been declining since 1997 when it reached a high of \$248 million; in 2002 it was just under \$200 million. The decline of the total general fund revenues has been due to declines in BGRT, hotel tax, excise tax, and the user fee.

Relative Share of total General Fund Operating Expenditures by Function

As a proportion of general fund operating expenditures, Health and Education expenditures increased slightly in the last five years. General Government declined markedly in 2002 from 2001. Debt service steadily increased in the last five years. In 2002, Health Expenditure was 21% of total operating expenditures, Education was 22%, General Government was about 15%, and Public Safety was about 10%.

# General Fund Operating Expenditures by Object Class

By object class, wages and salaries comprised over 60% of total general fund expenditures annually since 1995. The actual percentage fluctuated from year to year and reached a high of 69% in 2002. Professional services follows wage and salaries. These two combined comprised over over 70% of total general fund operating expenditure each years, since 1995 and reached a high of 77% in 2002.

Reported Business Gross Revenue

# Summary of Price Index

The CNMI Consumer Price Index increased nearly every year since 1988, with the exception of 1998 and 2001. The highest annual CPI increase was in 1992 when the index jumped by 25.1 points. The CPI declined in 2001 and increased only slightly in 2002. In 2001, the index declined for each of the five major groups; food index declined by -10.2 points, housing by -1.2 points, apparel and upkeeping by -0.8 point, transportation by -4.2 points, and health and recreation by -6.2 points. In 2002, the food and housing indexes declined further, but health and recreation, transportation, and apparel and upkeeping increased; on the net, the total index increase by a mere 0.1 point in 2002.

# Annual Movement in the CNMI's Consumer Price Index

The CNMI Consumer Price Index (CPI) increased in most of the years since 1988. It declined in 1998 by -1.5 points and in 2001 by -6.5 points. The highest CPI sinlge-year increase occurred in 1992 when figures jumped 25.1 index points from 214.4 to 239.5 by the year's end.

Chapter 15 LAND USE

### Summary of Land Use

Saipan is the CNMI's largest island, measuring approximately 47 square miles. Land elevation is highest in Agrihan, where the mountain peak reaches 3,166 feet above seal level. The total land area for the CNMI is about 176.5 square miles. Saipan is the CNMI's capital city and home to about 90% of the total population, is the most industrialized island in the drain.

Over the past six years, the number of village homestead permits issued fluctuated annually from 1997 to 2002. Also, in the last six years, land exchage cases went from a low of 13 to 746 cases in 2001 and declined to 278 in 2002. According to data provided by the Department of Land and Natural Resources, the majority of public land permits issued in 2002 were for agriculture and grazing. The highest number of permits were issued from the Island of Tinian; there were only two from Saipan and none from Rota.

# Summary of Territorial Comparisons

This concluding chapter sets CNMI's demographic and economic characteristics in context relative to the other insular areas, which include Guam, American Samoa, Virgin Islands. Descriptive data have been extracted primarily from the 2000 Census on Population and Housing conducted by the US Bureau of the Census in collaboration with insular teams.

The CNMI land area is very small compared to other insular areas. The CNMI's population and its density increased significantly between 1980 and 2000, but it was still lower than most of the other areas. Similarly, the CNMI's population density has increased in recent years, but was still lower compared to elsewhere.

Compared to the other insular areas in 2000, the CNMI had:

- · second smallest population;
- · lowest proportion of persons aged 65 years and older;
- second lowest proportion of married couples;
- second lowest fertility rate;
- · second highest percentage of residents with a high school degree;
- highest labor force participation rate;
- · highest proportion waren's participation rate;
- lowest unemployment rate;
- · smallest percentage of owner-occupied housing units; and
- · highest median house value.
