### Introduction/Instruction

This document consists of Appendix F, Appendix G, and Appendix H to the 2016 CNMI Prevailing Wage and Workforce Assessment Study: SOC Detailed Occupation Titles and Hourly Wages Report, dated 09/05/2017. The purpose of these appendices is to assist employers when completing Form ETA-9165 for the National Prevailing Wage Center. Appendix F: Number of Employers, Number of Employees, and Hourly Wage Statistics lists all 523 Detailed Titles that appeared in Table 4 of the main Report, but adds the number of employers, hourly wage minimum, maximum, and standard deviation. APPENDIX G: Number of Employers, Number of Employees, and Hourly Wage Statistics by SOC Major, Minor, Broad, and Detailed Titles shows the same statistics conforming to the structure of the 2012 SOC (Standard Occupational Classification) System. Appendix H: A Sample Form 9165 illustrates a filled out Form ETA 9165.

When completing Form ETA-9165, the guideline requires that the mean hourly wage for the occupation title in the Form must have been derived from at least three (3) different employers and from at least thirty (30) employees. Many of the SOC Detailed Titles in the 2016 PWWAS, as shown in Appendix F, do not meet these guideline requirements. Only 131 of the 523 Detailed Titles meet the guideline. In those cases where a title does not meet the guideline requirements, at the SOC Detailed Title level, one can use the number of employers, the number of employees, and the mean hourly wage rate at the Broad, Minor, or Major level where the requirements are met.

#### For example,

SOC Detailed Title and Code *Bakers, 513011*, from Appendix F, page F-4, row 35, meets the guidelines since the mean hourly wage of \$7.55 was derived from 22 employers and 80 employees, see illustration below.

#### However,

SOC Detailed Title and Code *Barbers, 395011* doesn't meet the guidelines since the mean hourly wage of \$6.66 for this title is based on 7 employers, but only 13 employees (the first requirement is met, but not the second). In this case, you will have to use Appendix G. To do this, take the SOC code 395011 from Appendix F, go to Appendix G, and look up the appropriate level of aggregation—Broad, Minor or Major—where the requirements are met and obtain the appropriate figures from there. Appendix G is organized by SOC structure which goes from the Major to the Detailed. Since you are interested in 395011, first find 39000 in the Major column, page G-14, row # 539. Under this Major title, scan down to the Detailed level and find the level of aggregation where there is at least 3 employers and 30 employees and use the number of employers, number of employees, and the mean hourly wage rate at that level. In this example, the guideline is satisfied at the Broad level, *395010 - Barber*, *Hairdressers, Hairstylists, and Cosmetologists*, row # 566, page G-19, where the number of employers is 32, the number of employees is 81, and the mean hourly wage rate is \$6.74. Use these figures in your Form.

In Saipan, all employers with 5 or more employees were included; there was 852 of these. The rest of employers in Saipan, 1,067, had less than 5 employees each. These employers with less than 5 employees were stratified by the number of employees (4, 3, 2, and 1) and a 100 employers from each of the four groups was randomly selected to represent each group. In addition, 50 each from each of the 4 groups was randomly selected and used as substitutes for situations when an employer has closed down, no longer have employees, refused participation, or could not be located by field data collectors. A total of 1,485 employers participated in the Survey: 80 from Tinian, 57 from Rota, and 1,348 from Saipan. Of the 1,485 employers that participated, 1,123 (52 from Tinian, 44 from Rota, and 1,027 from Saipan) reported on individual employees used to profile occupations in the 2016 PWWAS reports. Please see the 2016 PWWAS Report, dated 9/5/2017 for detail.

#### (E.4.\*\*)

The 1,589 is made up of 80 employers from Tinian, 57 from Rota, 852 employers with 5 or more employees in Saipan, 400 randomly selected employers in Saipan, and 200 substitutes from Saipan. The Survey contacted 1,485 of the 1,589 employers.
